Prutha's Reflections on Year 7



Prutha, a Year 8 student, reflects on her first year at JCG with enthusiasm and fond memories. "Year 7 was a year of growth and learning, she shares. *"We learnt to adapt to a new environment, make new friends, and engage in various exciting lessons. The highlights for me included the House events, particularly Sports Day, where we cheered ourselves hoarse, and the Festival of Cultures, where we explored different cultures and tasted succulent dishes."

Prutha also credits the support and guidance from teachers in helping her and her peers navigate their first year successfully. During her reflections, she mentions one poem that especially resonated with her as she transitioned into this new phase of her school life—Robert Frost's The Road Not Taken.

"I found great comfort in the final lines of this poem:

'Two roads diverged in a wood, and I

I took the one less travelled by,'

And that has made all the difference. It reminded me that even though Year 7 presented new and sometimes daunting challenges, choosing to embrace those

challenges has already made a huge difference in my growth."

House events form a significant part of the College community, fostering a sense of camaraderie and teamwork. **Leena** (Year 12), and **Emily** (Year 9), reflect on the power of House events.

Leena, speaking on House Music, shared, "House music is an event I enjoy every year. It helped me develop my performance skills and build confidence. The camaraderie I felt while singing alongside my housemates was truly special. Music brings people together, and House Music this year was a true representation of that."

Emily highlighted House Drama as an event that pushes students outside their comfort zones. "House Drama is a fantastic opportunity to connect with housemates and captains while building confidence. It's an annual highlight that helps us discover new friendships and a sense of belonging within the college."

Our College continues to champion creativity and academic excellence, offering opportunities for personal growth. **Eloise** (Year 13) and **Sophia** (Year 11), two students with a passion for different areas, reflect on their highlights.



Eloise recalls her experience with Sister Act, our school musical, as a pinnacle of her year, combining hard work with the joy of performance. "I played Sister Mary Patrick in our production of Sister Act. Sister Act was such a spectacular show and I'm so glad that I did it. Our school shows have always been a highlight of my time here. As well as being a creative outlet, throughout the years I've made so many lifelong friendships all of which I'm extremally grateful for. The JCG productions have always given me a sense of purpose when being in a school environment where I didn't always feel I could shine, and they sparked my love for performing, a passion which one

day I hope to make my career. Being in shows like Sister Act has been amazing and really rewarding. If you're given the opportunity to be part of something so special, I think you should take it because you might just find where you truly belong! If I hadn't auditioned for Calamity Jane back in Year. 8 I wouldn't be the person I am with the friendships and aspirations I have today!

Sophia, on the other hand, emphasises the importance of sport at JCG: "The College encourages sport for everyone, regardless of skill level. I love participating in house events like rounders and table tennis because they're fun and competitive." She also highlights her personal achievement of being awarded Sportswoman of the Month for her contribution to Jersey netball and her team's success.

Jersey College students had the chance to travel and broaden their horizons through various international trips, enhancing their global perspective.

Jess (Year 12) recalls the Italian trip to Lucca as part of her GCSE Italian course. "It was one of the best trips I've ever been on. We stayed with local families, practised our Italian, and explored cities like Pisa and Florence. The friendships we made and the memories we shared will stay with us forever."



Chloe and Bella (Year 13) reflect on their three-week expedition to Namibia. Bella recalls, "The most challenging yet rewarding part of the trip was volunteering at Otjohorongo Primary School, where we repainted classrooms and built playground equipment. It made me realise how fortunate we are and how grateful others can be with so little." Chloe adds, "Helping at the school taught me to appreciate the privileges we have and to question whether I've taken full advantage of the opportunities JCG has offered me."

Students also had the opportunity to enhance their

leadership and critical thinking skills through global competitions and intellectual challenges.

Tallie (Year 13) recounts her experience at the Model United Nations (MUN) conference at Queens College in Chester. "It helped develop my confidence and communication skills. Debating global issues gave me a broader perspective on the challenges people face around the world. This experience will aid me in my future career in media."

Shrusti (Year 13) highlights her participation in the Ritangle Maths Challenge. "The challenge pushed me to improve my problem-solving skills and think outside the box. Running Junior House Maths as a Senior Maths Prefect was another rewarding experience, seeing the enthusiasm of so many students participating."



Finally, **Arabella**, a Year 9 student, shares her passion for poetry, reminding us of the power of words. "Poetry is not just part of the English curriculum; it's a way to express thoughts, opinions, and emotions that might otherwise remain unspoken. It's a beautiful art form that allows us to string words together to create meaning."

As part of her reflections, Arabella shares her original poem titled 'Where We Belong,' which resonates deeply with many involved in our College:

Where We Belong

Within these walls, the echoes call,
Of laughter, learning, stories shared by all.
Through corridors, with friends we roam,
JCG, a place we call our home.
In every lesson, a new light sparked,

Competitions & Events

During the year, JCP pupils and JCG students entered competitions covering a wide range of curriculum areas and took part in a number of events. Here are some highlights:

JCP

Music

Achievements

Our music program has thrived, with significant milestones achieved:



- Choir Performances: Both the Junior and Senior Choirs showcased their talents at various events, including the 2023 Carol Service, the Gala Concert organized by Jersey Eisteddfod in March 2024, and the JCP Spring Concert in May 2024.
- Orchestral Growth: The JCP orchestra has expanded, performing at the Carol Service and the Eisteddfod Gala Concert alongside the Wind Ensemble.
- Extra-curricular Offerings: JCP continues to provide seven weekly extra-curricular music clubs, including the Strings Ensemble, Signing Choir, and Ukulele Club.
- Year 4 Brass and Woodwind Project: All Year 4 pupils

- received ten whole-class lessons on French Horn or Clarinet, culminating in a concert for parents. Several students continued with their instruments, joining the Wind Ensemble.
- Christmas Celebrations: The Year 2 production of The Angel Who Nearly Missed It All and the Reception performance of The Twinkly Nativity were highlights of our Christmas celebrations, alongside the KS2 JCP Carol Service enjoyed by the community.



- House Music Event: This year's House Music event featured 100 children, showcasing impressive performances from Year 6 musicians. Du Pre was crowned the winning house, with KS2 students participating in the House Choir competition led by Year 6 music leaders.
- Inaugural Spring Concert: Held at JCG, this concert featured all music ensembles and choirs, alongside soloists from the House Music event. The Year 6 music leaders played key roles in organising and introducing

performances, making it a successful celebration of JCP's musical talent.

 Year 6 Production: The annual production, Treasure Island, in June was a tremendous success, with exceptional singing and musical performances.

Competitions and Events

The music department has hosted several key events this year:

- Open Day: Our music room buzzed with excitement as children showcased their talents to a packed audience, with Polyphony tutors available for guidance and feedback.
- Music Chalets: New Music Chalets have been introduced for instrumental lessons, with the larger Millennium Garden chalet dedicated to cello and paired violin lessons, enhancing our teaching environment.

Despite a decline in the number of students taking weekly lessons with Polyphony from 98 in 2023 to 75 in 2024—partly due to changes in lesson structure and tutor availability—interest in strings, piano, and singing remains strong. It is essential to promote percussion, brass, and woodwind instruments to ensure the sustainability of our school orchestra and wind ensemble.

Looking ahead, we are committed to enhancing our music program and fostering a love for music among our students.

Achievements



Our students have excelled in numerous competitions throughout the year. Highlights include:

Primary Schools Athletics Championships: Lydia (Year
 6) and Elizabeth (Year 5) secured 3rd and 4th places

in the throwing finals, while Millie (Year 6) finished 3rd in the long jump. Amy (Year 6) became the Jersey U11 runner-up in the 800m final, finishing 2nd, and Azmeera (Year 6) was crowned Jersey champion in the U11 85m final and runner-up in the U11 long jump. Both the Year 5 and Year 6 relay teams claimed 2nd place in their finals. JCP achieved joint 1st place with St Michael's in the team competition, earning the title of joint primary school champions for 2024.

- Netball Performance: The Netball A team finished 4th in both their league and tournament. The Netball B team secured 2nd place in their league and tournament. Millie and Kiki (Year 6) successfully represented Jersey in the U11 netball inter-insular, winning against Guernsey 22-3.
- Cross Country and Other Events: In the October cross country event, Amy (Year 6) placed 4th among over 200 competitors, contributing to a 3rd place finish for the Year 5 and Year 6 team. Our joint participation in the primary school tag rugby tournament saw one of our teams reach the finals, finishing 2nd in a closely contested match. The Lions Club Swimarathon engaged 64 children and 8 staff members, raising £2,263 for local charities.
- Cricket Success: Our Year 6 cricket A team emerged victorious in the primary school's girls Kwik Cricket tournament.



House Competitions: A total of 177 students participated in the annual Key Stage 2 swimming galas, with Grandin winning overall. The Key Stage 1 sports day saw Gilbert as the winning house, while Grandin triumphed in the Key Stage 2 sports day, where new school records were established in sprint and distance events.

Lucia was the winner of the **Planet Prose**, a short story competition (15-18 category), with her piece 'She is Earth'. As part of their **Children's Festival**, the Jersey Arts Centre hosted an exhibition of creative writing reflecting islanders' perception, understanding and experience of the world today. We were incredibly proud that pieces from our year 7 students, Agnes, Eleanor, Esther, Freya, Lia and Reina,

were selected to be exhibited in the Berni Gallery.



In the Year 10 **House Debates**, students across the year group were involved in discussing the issue of free speech in social media, showing consideration and respect for others' points of view. Parental feedback from the finalists reflected the pride that students felt in their success: 'I think it's wonderful that JCG gives the students such great opportunities to learn skills which will benefit them throughout life',

'Hayden feels very proud of herself, she practiced at home and while she felt nervous she was very determined to not let anyone down',

'Penny was very proud of herself and enjoyed the debate very much... we are so pleased she had the opportunity to participate. I'm sure she would do it again in a heartbeat!'

In the Autumn Term, **House Poetry** was launched on the theme of Nostalgia. This attracted entries from across the school, including senior winner Kate (Year 12) and junior winner Arabella (Year 8).

JCG students continue to engage widely with other competitions, and we have broadened participation further this year. A large number of students have entered the Never Such Innocence Competition, The Commonwealth Essay Competition, the Jersey Festival of Words Competition, Martha Mills Young Writers Prize – with further winning entries to be announced in the new academic year.

48 entries into the **Anthea Bell Translation Prize**, run by Queen's College, Oxford University. This compares to 13 students in 2023. One student was selected as the winner of the Southwest area Italian KS4 section.



2 students entered the **Oxford University Flash Fiction** competition. One received a highly commended certificate.

Year 9 students again took part in the **GCHQ National** Language Competition, completing a series of codebreaking challenges.

We had a record 99 entries for **House Languages** (compared to 40 entries in the previous year), with entries across all year groups for French, Italian and Spanish; the standard was impressive.

Other achievements

- Two students were supported to sit Russian GCSE this year; tutoring sessions were organised to help them to prepare for this. Both achieved grade 9.
- One student was supported to sit Turkish GCSE this year; a visiting examiner was organised from the UK to conduct the speaking exam. This student achieved grade 7.
- One Year 9 student was supported in her early entry French GCSE, as French is a home language for her.
 She achieved grade 9.

Maths

Economics

Mabel entered the **Government of Jersey 'Future Economy' essay competition**, winning 1st prize which came with a
6-week, paid internship with the Government of Jersey's
Economics Unit. She wrote an essay on the following topic:
'Small businesses are a driver of innovation and economic
growth. What does economic theory and evidence tell us
about the role of small businesses in driving innovation
and economic growth, and, the factors, relevant to Jersey,
that would enable small businesses to grow and flourish?'

3 teams of 5 students entered the annual **Ashburton Share Challenge** competition. Our best team finished 6/25 teams but, overall, we ranked 5/6 for Jersey secondary schools.

Ashburton visited school and delivered a presentation on careers in investment banking and the fundamentals of portfolio management.

Computer Science

357 students took part in the **Bebras Challenge**, a national computing competition. Maisie, Eleanor, Lauren, and Cassie all won best in school in their age category. 40 students qualified for the follow-on **Oxford University Computer Challenge**, with many congratulations to Amelia and Prutha for gaining a Merit award.

Maths

JCG Sixth Form again entered students for the **MEI Ritangle** competition, successfully solving most of the first round problems. The event was led by the Maths prefects and involved Maths students in both Year 12 and 13 working



together.

Sixth Form students also entered the **UKMT Senior Maths Challenge** with Erin achieving a commendable Silver certificate.

In March, two Sixth Form teams (one from year 13 and one from Year 12) entered the **Liverpool Maths Society** annual Pop Maths Quiz, with the Year 12 team achieving an excellent Silver certificate and the Year 13 team a Bronze certificate.

Eight students entered the **Southampton Maths Challenge**, six in the Junior category and 2 in the Senior.

Prutha's solutions to the challenging problems won a Merit award which she received in person at the University of Southampton awards evening.

Our two Year 10 set 1 classes, taught by Mr Abraham and Mr Sleath, entered for the first time the **Mathematiques Sans Frontiers** competition, with each class forming a team fueled by Domino's pizzas. In this competition, run from Scotland, the first question is set and must be answered in a non-English European language. Both teams did well, with Mr Sleath's class narrowly pipping Mr Abraham's by one mark.

125 Year 9 and 10 students entered the **UKMT Intermediate**Maths Challenge, the most in recent years. Evie and EllaMae in Year 9 and Gisèle in Year 10 won Gold Certificates,
with Evie and Ella-Mae also qualifying for the follow-on
Kangaroo round. A further 7 students won Silver certificates
and 27 won Bronze certificates.

153 Year 7 and 8 students entered **UKMT Junior Maths Challenge**, with Lauren, Esther and Aashi all winning Gold certificates. Lauren and Esther also qualified for the Junior Kangaroo, both achieving Merit certificates.



House Maths again created a buzz of excitement as House teams battled it out with times-tables against the clock, problem solving rounds, and races. Well done to Curie-Fry (Year 7 winners), Inglis (Year 8 winners) and Inglis (Year 9 winers).

Science

Fourteen Year 12 students took part in the **Cambridge Chemistry Challenge** in June. Six students achieved a
Copper Award and were presented with certificates.



The student-led **House Science Fair** was successful in engaging more students (approximately 50) in scientific investigations.

The 'Think Like a Scientist' Science Roadshow was delivered to seven local primary schools. This gave approximately 300 Year 5 and 6 students an insight into science, and into the scientific equipment used in secondary schools.

All Year 10 took part in the **Junior Physics Challenge** (as part of the Physics Olympiad) in May. This was a national challenge to give students a chance to take part in a quiz that went beyond the scope of the GCSE Physics course. Students were awarded certificates to recognise their accomplishments. Ava was the only student, out of almost 100 at JCG, who was awarded a Gold Certificate. This really is a fantastic achievement and we are so proud of her consistent efforts at college.

The **Introduction to Dissection Club** has allowed students to refine and develop their dissection skills.

The **Biomedical Summer Programme** involved 19 students from multiple secondary schools across the island, exposing the students to different career pathways in health care.

8 students from most year groups helped during the **Lego Robotics Creative Minds** challenge day for primary school children. Approximately 20 primary schools took part.

6 Year 9 students successfully built and raced an underwater drone as part of the **Ports of Jersey Seaperch** competition against other schools and experienced fun and interesting aspects of Physics-related careers.



Attendance

The JCG overall attendance for 2023-2024 was 94%. This in line with the 2022-2023 figure; our target remains 96%.

In 2023-2024, two students were externally suspended (for 2.5 days in total)

The JCP overall attendance for 2022/2023 was 96.2%.

Educational Visits

JCP

Music



Music remains a vital part of life at JCP, with students engaging in numerous events throughout the year. Highlights include the Senior Choir's participation in the Young Voices Choir at the O2 Arena in London, where they joined a choir of 8,000 children, accompanied by professional musicians and dancers. This inspiring experience has garnered overwhelmingly positive feedback, and we are excited to plan a repeat opportunity for January 2026.

PE

In the past year, our PE curriculum has been enriched by various external partnerships. Notable visits from coaches representing Jersey Cricket, the Jersey Netball Association, a specialist Tennis Coach, and the Jersey Rugby Club have inspired our students and provided pathways for further involvement in sports outside of school. These collaborative efforts have strengthened our relationships with local sporting organizations.

Reception

Reception had a busy year! Susan Parker from Jèrriais Teaching Service came in to read the Jèrriais version of a Squash and a Squeeze "La Maîson Crêpie et Squouîzie" which had been specially adapted. Every child was also given their own copy of the book to take home with a link to listen to it being read in Jèrriais.

Monya Van Den Berg from the Jersey Hedgehog Preservation Trust came into reception to speak to the 3 Reception classes about hedgehogs. The children have been learning about the changing seasons and Monya was able to teach them what a healthy hedgehog looks like and when you should call for help. They got to look at hedgehog spines close up and a sample of poo!!



Kaz Padidar from Wild Adventures joined Reception for one of their weekly Forest School sessions as part of the One Tree Day event. He taught the children how to build dens. Three police officers brought different vehicles for the children to go in and find out about how the police can help us. For Mother's Day the children learned some songs, a class poem and painted portraits of their mothers. Parents were invited for a special assembly where the children shared their learning. In May the 3 classes went to Lodge Farm. Here they met Becky Houze, the farmer, who gave them a tour of the farm. They got to stroke the calves, see the milking parlour, see the bull and the pregnant sows and go in the tractor.

In June, the three Reception classes visited La Rocque beach. They built sandcastles, did some beach art and went rock pooling.

Year 1



Year1had a year full of adventure and discovery. In October and November, they explored wildlife with trips to the Zoo, where they learned about animals and conservation efforts. In February, they travelled to Gorey Castle, stepping back in time to learn about Jersey's history and medieval architecture. Year1 enriched their learning about Judaism with a visit from Mrs Bernstein who brought real Challah bread for the class to try whilst learning about Shabbat.

In the Summer term, Year 1 learned all about Dog Safety from Mandy from Child Accident Prevention Jersey. We learnt how to look for the signs to tell a dog's mood and what to do if a dog approaches us.

Year 2



Year 2 children had an enriching experience participating in various trips throughout the academic year. In November, they learned about the recycling process and sustainability with a trip to La Collette Recycling Centre. In February, they explored maritime safety and learned

about the work of the RNLI with a visit to St Catherine's Lifeboat Station. Lastly, in June, they broadened their cultural understanding with a trip to the Mosque, learning about different religions, beliefs and communities.

Year 3



Year 3 children had a busy and exciting year. In October, they visited a Farm, exploring agricultural life and local produce. In January and February, they participated in the French Eisteddfod, showcasing their language skills and performing on stage. During Diwali they welcomed parents from the Hindu community who shared why and how Diwali was celebrated in their families. In the Easter term they held a 'Late night Lock-In' to tie in with an adventure story about an Egyptian Museum adventure. They stayed in school until dark, played Egyptian games and a scavenger hunt, watched an Egyptian theme movie and ate dinner together. Much fun was had. In June, they celebrated World Ocean Day by visiting L'etacq and learning about marine conservation. The year wrapped up with a fun trip to Greve de Lecq Beach in July, where they enjoyed the seaside and reflected on their year's achievements.

Year 4



Year 4 had an educational and engaging year of trips. In October, they visited La Hougue Bie, discovering more about Jersey's ancient history as well as a visit to Jersey Zoo for JCP's Science Week. In January and February, they joined Year 3 in participating in the French Eisteddfod, performing French-language pieces. Also in January, Year

4 had a visit from a dentist to supplement the learning in Science on teeth and how to look after your teeth. In March, they delved into medieval history with a visit to Mont Orgeuil, and a visit to Greve de Lecq beach rounded off the topic 'Coasts' where pupils looked at coastal features and met with JCG students for a beach clean

Year 5



Year 5 had a year filled with both cultural and adventurous activities. In October, they experienced life in Victorian times with the Victorian Town Trail and visit to the Merchant's House at Jersey Museum, attended a Concert at the Methodist Church, and participated in the Primary Cross Country event with Year 6. In December, the year group was visited by Reverend Tony Morling from St Helier Methodist Church, who spoke to the students about the Christian symbols of Christmas. In February, they visited Jersey Zoo to find out more about the layers of the rainforest and the animals that live there. In April, they visited the States Chamber, where they learned about government and politics. The excitement continued in June and July, when they spent multiple days at the Scout Centre. This was followed by Water Safety at Harve des Pas and Safety in Action sessions at Highlands College, when Year 5 learnt about other ways to stay safe, such as what to do in the event of a fire. Their adventure-filled year concluded with a Snorkelling Program at Langford Pool and Bouley Bay.

Year 6

Year 6 students experienced a year full of memorable events. In October, they participated in the Primary Cross Country event with Year 5. In January, they showcased their musical talents at the Senior Choir at the O2, and in March, they had the opportunity to watch the Year 6

Show at VCP. Mrs Otterwell from Jersey Heritage came in to do a workshop about the Holocaust and the Jersey 21. A team of Y6 children took part in the De Putron Challenge and won the Jersey heats and played in the inter island final against Guernsey. They watched Sister Act at JCG which inspired them for their own production. Mr Frigot and Janet Willis came in to talk to them about WW2 and the Occupation. Janet Willis also came to do a textile project with them. Throughout the year Lauren Devine came over from JCG to do workshops and discussions about Transition. We also took the children over to JCG for Transition activities and donuts!



The highlight of their year came in July with an exciting French Trip, where they explored French culture and history. To finish the year, they celebrated with a fun Cinema Trip before saying farewell to primary school.

She delivered three talks to GCSE and A Level Drama students about her role in the film, TV and theatre industry. Students gained experience of what directors and casting agents are looking for in auditions.

Food & Nutrition



On Tuesday 12 December, Year 10 Food & Nutrition students participated in the annual Shelter Trust's Soup Kitchen in the Royal Square and helped the charity raise in excess of £23,000.

This year was the 25th year the charity has organised this event and it turned out to be the most successful event to date. The aim of this big community event is to raise money to help homeless people in Jersey. We also found out there are approximately 100 people sleeping with the Shelter Trust regularly.

PE



Jasmine Harrison Visit: The Year 13 Sports Captains and Sports Ambassadors had the privilege of a Question & Answer discussion session during lunchtime with the adventurer and rower, Jasmine Harrison. Jasmine is the youngest solo female to row the Atlantic Ocean and the first female to swim the full length of the British Isles. Jasmine also spoke during assembly on her past achievements, challenges and her future events.

English & Media



The year 13 trip to London was a huge success in its first year, and this is being repeated in the new academic year. The trip included visits to the Guardian Newsroom, Sky TV, and the West End theatre.



Year 12 visited ITV Channel TV and attended a workshop on news and working in creative industries.

English cinema trips included the National Theatre Live screenings of Uncle Vanya and Life of Pi, as well as a screening of The Color Purple.

Year 12 attended the Jersey Festival of Words for an evening with poet Laureate, Simon Armitage. This was an opportunity for students to hear Armitage speak about his career and read a selection of poems from his earliest collections through to his latest works.

As well as trips, JCG hosted visits from the JEP and Jersey Arts Centre, which involved interactive workshops with our students.

Humanities



Year 11 History: Krakow and Auschwitz - December 2023
Year 11 History students visited various historical sites in the Polish city of Krakow including Schindler's factory. They also spent a day on a guided tour of Auschwitz-Birkenau extermination camp.

Languages

Lucca: 20 students from Year 10-13 benefited immensely from a full immersion cultural experience in Lucca. They stayed with Italian host families, attended lessons in a language school and enjoyed cultural visits in Lucca, Pisa and Florence.



San Sebastián: 30 students from Year 10-13 took part in a full immersion study visit to San Sebastián, during which they had the opportunity to develop their language skills and deepen their understanding of Spanish culture.

Rouen: Planning is underway to take a group of 40 students from Years 10-13 to Rouen in October 2024.

Maths, Computer Science and Economics Maths



All Year 7 students visited **Highlands College** twice this year: in January for a great carousel of activities focusing on using a scientific calculator and in July for an opportunity to try out the fabulous collection of puzzles curated and expanded each year by the Maths Department at Highlands.

This was an exciting and rare opportunity for people to have a look at the Merlin Helicopter up close and in person, get inside and have a look around and talk to currently serving Aeronautical Engineers and Pilots to see if a career in the Royal Navy is for them.
