
Earlier this year, our whole team were incredibly proud of



### **Pastoral Care**

During my role as Pastoral Lead here at JCP, I have had the privilege of creating a wonderful well-being room that has quickly become a favourite among our pupils.

In just 8 short months, the room has been transformed into a warm, welcoming space, adapting to the needs of our school community with ease. I am thrilled to see the children's enthusiasm as they come to visit the wellbeing room, whether it is for a one-to-one session or in a small group. The children are also able to arrange via their teachers, a check in with me during their lunchtime, when they might need some emotional support or a space to unwind.

One of my first projects that I was keen to get underway was to conduct a whole school well-being survey. Social and emotional wellbeing is essential for effective learning, yet there will always be pupils who lack confidence in their learning and who don't always feel connected with school and their teachers. The Pupils Attitudes to School and Self (PASS) Assessment, takes the guesswork out of understanding why this might be, focusing on three broad areas – how a pupil feels about themselves, their engagement with the curriculum, and their feelings



about school. All children from Year 1 to Year 6 took this questionnaire back in the Autumn Term and we are hugely encouraged by the results. We will be sharing these results in more detail during the coming weeks.

We have also recently launched the Well-Being Ambassador programme. Pupils from Key Stage 2 were invited to apply by writing a letter outlining why they would make a great ambassador. We had 61 applications, and it was a mammoth task selecting the successful applicants. The letters were beautifully written, and I was so proud of how well the pupils here understand so much about the importance of well-being. Eight ambassadors were chosen, a representative from each Key Stage 2 class. After some initial training sessions, these pupils will become fully

fledged ambassadors, who alongside myself will help to promote the well-being in our school community. We have plans to meet regularly with the Key Stage one children to gather their views and ideas on what well-being means to them, and we are making plans on how we can help the wider community on our island too.

I am truly honoured to have this role in school, I can't believe that I have almost been here a year already! I am incredibly proud of the staff here at JCP, together we are working tirelessly to ensure that the well-being of our pupils is a top priority, and I am excited to see what the future holds as we continue to grow and evolve our well-being initiatives.

# Science Week: Our World, Our Responsibility!

The main focus of Science Week was to provide exciting and educational science experiences for all students... no matter the age!

The week-long event immersed our pupils in the world of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) as they engaged in hands-on activities exploring the pressing environmental issues facing our planet, such as climate change, pollution and resource depletion, trying to focus on sustainability. Our aims were for all pupils to collaborate with peers across their year groups, conduct experiments and work on innovative solutions, encouraging critical thinking and problem-solving skills.

The week kicked off with a visit from the Explorer Dome team! A range of year groups had the opportunity to dive

head first into a mind-blowing demonstration and talk from the team. The talks ranged from Earth and Space for Year 5, to Environments for Year 1, where students experienced dry ice and mist, making them feel like they were actually in those varying environments around our planet. The week ended with a 'Dress Down Day', where pupils were encouraged to dress up as a famous scientist. On this day we also had a whole school assembly, where each year group got to come and share their STEM challenges, their prototypes and their findings. It is safe to say that there were a lot of excited faces during the week and everyone learnt something new- what a success!

### Art Week

Mrs Killick From 15th to 19th January 2024, we welcomed four different artists into JCP to work across the school during our annual Art week.



Children in **Reception** were guided by artist Janet Willis, to observe and mould different forms to create penauins. These were fired and glazed and we love having our own colony of Antarctic penguins living in the Reception area!



Following a theme of electricity, to tie in with their topic on transport, Kelly Eastwood helped the children in Year 2 create electricity in a jar through colour mixing and soaking cotton wool. The children used salt paintings to represent bolts of electricity, over worked with vibrant colours. Much fun was had!



In Year 1, Margarida Lourenco encouraged pupils to observe detail in seasonal, wintery flora and fauna. Then using cool colours in oils and paints they created images on fabric by printing, rubbing and drawing. The children then sewed into their designs- the overall effect was impressive!



Children in Year 3 used traditional Ancient Egyptian coloured yarn to embroider designs and patterns onto linen. Through Margarida's guidance, the children became adept at threading needles, and showed perseverance and patience to create simple patterns with stitching.



Artist Anna Shipley, took the **Year 4** topic of Invaders and Settlers in a creative direction! Children observed and drew invasive species to the island such as the Asian Hornet and the non-native rat like coypu. Children worked together to create abstract representations of the journey taken by these creatures. The hanging globes create an interesting talking point!



**Year 5** collaborated on large fabric hangings, having been inspired by Margarida, who shared the work of different

artists with them. The process involved drawing tropical shapes, interweaving and overlapping foliage and flowers. Using glue as a resist, brightly coloured inks were applied, and the overall results are quite stunning!



A mindful, peaceful time was had by all in **Year 6**, who were led by Janet Willis to create fabric collages, overlayed with different, intricate stitching techniques. The children were enthralled by the stories of all the different pieces of fabric and the final pieces show great attention to detail, pattern and colour.

Many new skills and techniques were experienced throughout the week and we thank all the artists for coming in to work with us.

### French Eisteddfod



### Maths Day

On Wednesday 15th May JCP enjoyed Maths Day with lots of different activities taking place.

Each year group took part in an investigative activity that encouraged them to think mathematically. Reception explored the different ways ten eggs could be split over three plates. Year 1 played a game filling up a 5X5 grid by rolling a dice. Year 2 tried to find which symmetrical patterns could be made with 8 beads of 2 colours. Year 3 had to solve a domino puzzle where each side had the same total of dots. Year 4 investigated what shapes could be made by arranging different beads. Year 5 tried to solve a puzzle where several different sized squares could be arranged into a rectangle. Year 6 had to arrange some given dominos into squares but had to compare fractions,

decimals and percentages. The children used lots of different mathematical skills including, noticing patterns, reasoning, working systematically, calculating, evaluating and many more.

We had a lot of fun weighing potatoes! It was great to hear lots of mathematical language when children were weighing and comparing their potatoes. 3D had the heaviest potato and we found the heaviest sweet potato in 1D. In our assembly we thought about how maths is everywhere and that we are using maths all the time without realising because it can look different.





They spent the half term break working alongside other Jersey teachers in different schools in Bugarama, Rwanda. After an 8 hour plane journey followed by a 9 hour bus ride, they arrived in Bugarama on Saturday 25th May ready to go into schools on the Monday.

Since 1972 Jersey Overseas Aid has facilitated parties of volunteers to work with communities in developing countries. The Rwanda project, in partnership with Jersey Education and a local charity, Hands around the

World, enables skilled professionals to work alongside Rwandan teachers in a one-to-one approach. In addition to classroom-based team-teaching, Jersey teachers work together with the Rwandan school syllabus, exchanging knowledge, skills and experience. They all feel the experience benefited both the Rwandan teachers and themselves professionally and personally. Good relationships have been forged with teachers and pupils which will hopefully pave the way to continue support in years to come.

The classes used junk modelling materials utilising their knowledge of hard and soft materials to build their jackets. Then we had a lot of fun assessing their safety jackets with real eggs! Max said: 'I liked that my egg did not break. It was fun to stand up the wall and drop eggs in school and we even got to use real eggs.'





### **Zoo Visit**

To deepen Year 1's understanding of animal groups the classes went to visit Jersey Zoo.

We spent the morning in their learning centre getting to characterise different animals into their groups and then spent time exploring the zoo and observing different animals. Lauren said: 'I liked seeing all the animals and

working out what group they were in. In the zoo, I liked seeing the bears and learning about reptiles, fish, and amphibians.'

# La Hougue Bie

Our Autumn topic was the Neolithic Age and we learnt about this in both a global and a local context.

We also visited La Hougue Bie as part of the topic. At La Hougue Bie, we worked on sharpening axes; grinding corn to make flour using real Neolithic querns; as well as visiting the passage grave - it was very dark and very damp! We

also produced a 'Stone Age' timeline using PowerPoint as part of our computing curriculum. We had a great day and learnt a lot by trying lots of stone age activities.



### Music

### The first challenge of Year 4 was to learn to play a new instrument!

4P tackled the clarinet and 4J learned the French Horn. Each class finished with a final concert to a room full of impressed parents!





# Creativity

#### We enjoyed a wide variety of art activities during the year. .

We explored a range of mediums including sketching, pastels, clay and paint. We also did some clay work with pottery to link with our Neolithic topic. We produced some 'cave art'; as well as some super 'Neolithic' sketches of the long house at La Hougue Bie.

We also used coasts as a starting to produce some work based on Peter Knight's coastal scenes around Jersey and produced some silk painting. We also designed and produced some innovative types of bread.



### In Science, we learned about 'Electricity and Circuits' as well as 'States of matter'.

As part of the former, we designed and built our own switches. For the latter, we learned about the water cycle and a catchy song about it. We even had to work out how to get 'Swig the alien' out of a block of ice.

In the Spring, we investigated sound and how it travels. We used decibels to measure different sounds around the school as well as to test the sound insulation properties of

certain materials. Our learning on sound was showcased in an assembly in which all pupils were involved, either acting, singing or sharing interesting facts. We also had a lot of fun learning about digestion and how the body works! This included making a working model of the whole digestive process -YES! the whole process!! We also designed an 'eggsperiment' to look at dental health and how our teeth can be affected by sugars and acids.



# Mont Orgueil

#### In March, we visited Mont Orgueil Castle

This linked with the history topic on the Normans. We learnt that the castle was built in 1204. We learnt about the castle and about the many attempts that were made to try and overrun the castle. As well as visiting many parts of the

castle, we reenacted the struggle between England and France and learnt how Jersey swore allegiance to the English crown.

### States Chamber

Our class were welcomed to the States Chamber by two courteous members of the States Greffe, who kindly greeted us at the door and gave us some interesting insights into the history of democracy and decision making in Jersey.

They gave us a tour of the chamber, before we were led to our seats, which were the seats of current States Members. We explored the architecture and again talked about the history of the different roles, proceedings and artefacts tool

Following a roll call and the Lord's Prayer (in French), we

were able to run our debate- exploring whether or not 4,300 homes should be built on our island. The Proposer initiated the discussion, followed by the Seconder and then each member of the class had their say! Ultimately, the class voted against the proposition, in favour of a cleaner, less over-populated island with more green space! Here, here





Year 5 went on a captivating trip to the States Chambers in town, we went through the members' entrance and learnt a lot about the States history.

When we entered, we sat in our designated seats, and we were taught more about the history of the States Chambers.

First, the Greffier did the roll call, for instance 'Madame Connétables' followed by our surnames. When our names were called out, we would turn on our microphones and say, 'presente' in French.

Next, the Usher came into the chamber and announced in a loud and commanding voice, 'THE BAILLIFF' and then everyone stood. We could only sit down when the Bailiff sat down. The Usher also had the task of passing notes from the Greffier to the member taking part in the debate.

After that, the Dean read out the Lord's Prayer in French and we all had to stand and listen to it and say 'Amen' at the end. The Dean was allowed to take part in the debate,

but she was not allowed to vote.

To start off the debate, the Bailiff invited the Proposer to speak first. Next, the Bailiff invited the Seconder to speak. The Proposer also spoke at the end to respond to arguments and briefly remind everyone why they should vote for the proposition.

At the end, we were shown the golden mace which was given to King Charles II. Special gloves have to be worn when this is handled so that the mace stays shiny and gold as it is only cleaned every 20 years. It is placed in front of the Bailiff during States meetings.

Year 5 absolutely loved their visit, and we learnt a lot about the States Chambers.





A rather strict school inspector even visited, testing them on their '3 Rs' (Reading, Writing and Arithmetic!). Other activities ranged from drill, nail inspection, intricate drawing and sewing. Of course, Victorian Day wouldn't have been complete without numerous punishments bring dished out for truancy, slouching, messy work and not standing when an adult entered the room. These punishments were given out by the foreboding pair of teachers 'Miss Prim' and 'Miss Proper'.

Den building was another of the highlights

of the trip, where students worked in small teams to create a shelter that would keep out the rain. This was tested when buckets of water were thrown at the den while the groups sheltered inside! After all the exciting activities, the classes had plenty of time to bond with their peers, especially with an amazing talent show and a relaxing session of yoga, which was a real treat!

# Snorkelling

We had the privilege of working with Blue Marine Foundation to explore our local waters- the habitats, flora and fauna.

We began with a classroom session about the marine life around Jersey and more information on islanders can protect it. We then learnt the essential skills involved in snorkelling including using the kit and duck diving to explore. The week ended on a high, with both classes

# 2023 Prize Giving

Our annual Prize Giving Ceremony took place on Friday 8th September 2023, and we had the pleasure of having the inspiring Serena Kersten MBE as our guest speaker.

Former netballer, Serena Kersten MBE went to Le Rocquier School. She is one of the best known sporting stars from Jersey - a former England captain, she won 110 caps for her country and was part of the team that won Gold at the 2018 Commonwealth Games at the Gold Coast. The majority of her career was spent playing for Team Bath, but she also enjoyed spells at Northern Mystics in New Zealand, and Giants Netball in Australia, playing in the best league in the world, the ANZ championship and Suncorp Super Netball League. Serena was a dynamic player who played in the Centre, Wing Attack and Wing Defence positions.

Serena was appointed Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) in the 2020 New Year Honours for services to netball. She now works as Performance Lead for Jersey Netball.

In her inspiring address to the College, she reminded all of us of the power of our choices, to take risks and embrace failure as an opportunity to learn more about ourselves and to stick with our values and to let our passions drive us. In his speech, our Principal, Mr Howarth, stressed the importance of one's character and values. "Character refers to a person's moral and ethical qualities, values, and traits that shape their behaviour, decisions, and interactions with others. It represents the fundamental essence of who a person is and how they conduct themselves in various situations. Character is a reflection of a person's inner beliefs, principles, and integrity.

# VAWG Taskforce Report

In November 2023, Chloe, Jemimah and Estelle attended the launch of the report from the Taskforce established in 2022 to tackle violence against women and girls (VAWG) in Jersey.

They presented on their participation and contribution to the findings of the Violence Against Women and Girls Report, which submitted 77 recommendations to the Government on how to end violence towards women and girls in all forms. Our students were part of designing the young people's survey, which 1,800 young people took part in on the island, discussing their awareness and understanding of violence against women and girls in Jersey. JCG were supported in solidarity by Victoria College's Head Boy Team, Jack and Isaac, showing how we need both men and women to be part of the solution to this violence.

This was a significant moment in Jersey's history, in which JCG students used their voice to call for change and end violence against women and girls in their community.

As a College, we welcomed the publication of the findings from the Taskforce. We were extremely proud of our students who were involved in the research and helped craft the young people's survey. Their desire to make

Jersey a safer and more respectful society, for women and girls in particular, should be shared by everyone.

We all have a responsibility to be part of the solution in ending violence against women and girls and, with the support of the entire community, we can make this a reality for women and girls today and for future generations.

# Cole K S Wou Memorial Trust Award 2024

Former student, Isabella May, was selected by Dr Wou to receive the Cole KS Wou Memorial Trust Award 2024 in January.

The Cole K S Wou Memorial Trust was formed in 1979, in memory of Dr Wou's brother, to provide financial assistance to help recipients advance their studies in specific subjects, one of these being "the advancement of education in Chinese". Dr Wou was impressed by Isabella's academic achievements at JCG and, in particular, her proactive approach to her studies.

A first year student at the University of Sheffield, studying for a BA in Chinese Studies with Japanese, Isabella shared what she has been doing this year and how the award will help her.

"I am really enjoying the course for its breadth and variety of subjects. It is often a presumption that a degree like this is all about language study, but I have found it to be so much more. In addition to a wide grounding in language construction and use, I am also studying the history and culture of China, as well as its historical and modern interactions with other East Asian countries. Here in Sheffield, we have the largest Chinese student population

in the UK, so there are plenty of places both to eat and to shop for Asian food, and I often cook Asian food in my flat. Another plus is hearing Chinese spoken everywhere!


Outside of college, I have really enjoyed joining societies, starting new hobbies and meeting new people. I have attended the International Food Festival, Mid-Autumn festival and performances, and also language and cultural exchanges. I have just started studying Taekwondo, which I do twice a week, and have also recently achieved my Yellow Belt. I also attend regular language social events, which give me the chance to listen and practise my skills in a friendly environment. The School of East Asian Studies, provides an opportunity to study abroad, and I am looking forward to spending my third year attending Nanjing University, near Shanghai. I will live as a local student for the duration and have lessons in Chinese - which will be a fully immersive experience! I also hope to travel around China whilst there, to gain as much knowledge and experience of local life as I can.

On my course, we are constantly being bombarded with interesting facts. We recently learnt about the influence of the Chinese Imperial Civil Service Exams on the language of many other East Asian countries – even those in Central Asia. These exams use classical Chinese scripts and have been adapted to regional legal systems – even before some local scripts were fully developed. Examples of this are Devanagari and Sanskrit – literate people spoke these languages, but wrote in classical Chinese.



# Liberate Special Award

In February, Jersey College for Girls was deeply honoured to be awarded the Liberate Special Award jointly with Victoria College for the work both Colleges have done to reduce the incidents of violence against women and girls.

The Liberate Special Award is presented for "an extraordinary and significant piece of work in the field of diversity, inclusion, fairness, equality, respect or acceptance" as Vic Tanner-Davy, Liberate's CEO, explained.

"The work done by JCG and Victoria College jointly to reduce the incidence of violence against women and girls is just such a project," he added.

"The way in which the two schools responded to the problem highlighted in 2021 was exemplary. It would have been so easy to deny the problem or park it, but the leadership team, staff and students instead tackled it head on, and within two years have become a beacon of outstanding practice through their own initiatives and engagement with the wider island conversation.



"There was no doubt in our minds that this work needed special recognition as an example of what can be done through dedication and determination – something which the whole island needs to learn from in tackling this issue."

In her speech at the award ceremony on Friday 2nd February, Jemimah, JCG's Prefect for Inclusion, Diversity, Equity and Activism, said:

"This holds a special place in all our hearts as it is a symbol of our collective commitment to addressing the critical issue of violence against women and girls," she added.

"This achievement would not have been possible without the unwavering support of our teachers. JCG has been at the forefront of promoting gender equality and combating gender-based violence for the longest time. Mr Howarth and Mrs Mynes, your encouragement, guidance and belief in us and our contribution to solving this issue has been invaluable, thank you. We are so lucky to attend a school which encourages us to voice our opinions on these issues.

"Violence against women and girls is an urgent and pervasive issue that demands our unwavering attention and action. It is something which affects individuals and communities worldwide, regardless of age, race, or socio-

economic status. Together we have embarked on a mission to raise awareness, promote education and advocate for

systemic change.



"We are deeply grateful to Liberate, the organisers of this event, for shining a spotlight on the importance of addressing issues surrounding equality, diversity, and inclusion.

"To the survivors of violence, your courage and resilience inspires us all. Your voices matter and your stories empower us to continue our work and our fight for change.

"As we all stand here tonight, let me reaffirm our collective resolve to champion equality and justice for all. Let us all continue to challenge harmful norms, dismantle oppressive structures, and create inclusive spaces where every individual can thrive.

"Thank you again for this incredible honour. Together, let us be the change we wish to see in the world." Mrs Danielle Mynes, English Teacher and Interim Head of PSHE, added: "We will continue to champion our students' voices and work to end all forms of violence against women and girls. Our students across both colleges have shown that VAWG can no longer be the wallpaper to women's and girls' lives. This award recognises how both schools have prioritised respect, inclusion, and equality, and I feel so proud and privileged to work alongside such inspiring young people."



The cast of Sister Act had the privilege to be invited to perform at the end of the awards ceremony, which was held on Friday 2nd February at Jersey Arts Centre. They sang the musical's closing song, inviting everyone to 'Spread the Love Around'.





In late February, planting started on the wellbeing field, marking the culmination of an important project for the College as plans were first drawn up in February 2014.

The start of the planting followed the Planning Department's approval of the College's plans to turn agricultural land into an educational amenity with associated boundary fence and landscaping work in 2023.

The new space provides an informal "break out" space to benefit the wellbeing and mental health of students from JCP and JCG. It can be used as a recreational space, for outdoor learning, informal games and ecological study.

Students from both JCP and JCG worked with local charity Jersey Trees for Life to plant the hedgerow that surrounds the field. This served as an educational opportunity about the importance of wildlife and the promotion of biodiversity.

JCP's Eco Team planted the very first tree and pupils from Key Stage 2 as well as students from Year 7 got involved to plant a total of 360 trees - including hawthorn, blackthorn, elder, hazel, field maple, holly and wild cherry.

Sylvie, from Year 6, said: "I found the tree planting a really enjoyable experience. It was so nice knowing that the whip I had planted could be part of something bigger. Everyone from Jersey Trees for Life were so kind, helpful and understanding. The trees will make the field so beautiful and will act as a great home for Jersey's wildlife. I can't wait for the hawthorns to grow and bloom for many years to come."



# Jersey Tech Awards win for Ms Lea



We are incredibly proud that Ruth Lea, our Assistant Headteacher for Digital Learning, won the Teacher Award at Digital Jersey's 6th annual Jersey Tech Awards.

The category recognises "a technology educator for their exceptional contribution to tech teaching".

Ms Lea said: "It is wonderful to be recognised for how we have transformed the way we use technology to support teaching and learning. It has been a huge team effort, and nothing would have been achieved without the continuous uplifting support from an amazing Senior Leadership Team and the effort and drive of Emily Le Hegarat, our amazing IT manager. I also need to thank my teaching colleagues who were willing to adapt and step out of their comfort zone, and who showed resilience and perseverance when things did not always go according to plan. Finally, I want to thank our parents for trusting us, and our students for embracing the change and allowing us to transform how we do things."

Ms Lea spearheaded JCG's Digital Learning project, which

launched in September 2021 to enhance the teaching and learning experience, bridge gaps in learning and support students absent from lessons.

In September 2021, all Year 7 students were asked to come to College with a digital device - equipped with a camera, track-pad keyboard and digital stylus. Following the success of this first year, the project was expanded to other year groups and, since September 2023, all students now have their own device to use in lessons.

The project has yielded many benefits for students, including improved organisation, fewer books to carry, easier submission of work and improved typing skills, whilst increasing efficiencies for teachers. There were also environmental and financial benefits as the introduction of digital devices has led to a reduction in paper use and printing costs.


We wanted a café that would be open all day and would not only be as good as any café in St. Helier but also would not feel like you were in a school.

# **Table Talks**

This year, we introduced Table Talks for our students' parents.

Earlier in the academic year, we had written to them to outline our aspirations to strengthen the crucial partnership they enjoy with the College: Our ambition is to welcome parents into College more frequently and to discuss a greater variety of topics that will best enable you to support your children to flourish in all aspects of their lives. We would like to empower you, as parents, to share your collective wisdom and experience, and to facilitate powerful conversations between our parent community about how best to meet the challenges of nurturing young people to thrive in a complex world.

The first step was to obtain feedback on the subjects parents see as priority areas for discussion with staff and fellow parents in College. We were grateful for the huge number of responses we received, which allowed us to formulate an initial list of topics (all of which had attracted at least 90 expressions of interest):

- How can I maintain a strong and open relationship with my child through their adolescence?
- How much work should my child be doing, and how can I best support them to manage this?
- What does cognitive science tell us about how young people learn most effectively?
- How can I help my child to overcome worries and fears?
- How can I help my child to navigate difficulties with friends?

The first two topics were explored through what became the first Table Talks events: Table Talks: building strong bonds, one conversation at a time. At Jersey College for Girls, we believe in the power of shared moments around the table, where parents come together to nurture not only their children but also the strong bonds within our community. This forum serves as a space where JCG parents can engage in meaningful conversations,

fostering connections that go beyond the everyday challenges of raising adolescents.

At the two events (one in February and one in May), parents came together for a meal in College. Eating together proved to be an important factor in the success of this venture, setting the tone of relaxed and open conversation. Another vital ingredient was the input of expert speakers, who provided the stimulus for discussion around the table.

The topic of 'how can I maintain a strong and open relationship with my child through their adolescence?' was introduced by Dr Charlotte Clarke, Clinical Director at When the Adults Change. Dr Clarke is passionate about helping schools and parents look beyond behaviour in order to think about the longer term physical and mental benefits that occur when the adults change. Dr Clarke was able to share a number of enormously practical and helpful techniques to deploy in potentially challenging conversations with young people, including the following:

- Positive noticing (drawing attention to some of the many good things our children do, which make us proud)
- 'I notice that...' (a non-confrontational way to draw attention to conduct that needs to be questioned or challenged)
- 'That may be true, and yet I need you to...' (a script for acknowledging and validating what a young person is saying whilst ultimately redirecting them to an expectation that needs to be met)

In May, Dr Victoria Cook guided us through the question of 'what does cognitive science tell us about how young people learn most effectively?'. Dr Cook is Education and Research Specialist at the Chartered College of Teaching, and co-author of the recent paper 'Cognitive science in education: teachers' priorities for research'. Dr Cook outlined empowering research about how parents can support their children to nurture the physiological

underpinnings of learning.

Parental feedback on both sessions was very encouraging, and has included the following comments: "I found the discussion very interesting and informative, it was also reassuring to hear that I'm not alone, and that we all struggle from time to time with our teenagers. I have already started to put into practice some of the strategies that Dr Clarke discussed with us on the night as she reminded us how effective simple strategies can be. I look forward to the next Table Talks discussion when it takes place"

"A big thank you for the opportunity to hear the fascinating presentation from Dr Cook last week. It was also a pleasure to be able to take part in the discussion afterwards and share ideas with other parents. I look forward to more of these workshops and would recommend them to any

JCG parent as a way to support their children's learning and development. It underlined the importance of the parental role in preparing our children to best learn and study, which I think is often undervalued - school can only do so much and it is up to us to optimise the conditions and predispositions to be able to access all the learning and opportunities that our lucky girls have on offer at JCG."

Teachers came away from the sessions with ideas of how to build a subject-specific chatbot. Dan had worked with some of our students and staff the previous day and was

impressed by their use of technology, "I was particularly inspired by your insights into the potential of AI in education at JCG. Your work is inspiring, and I am confident that it will have a major impact on your girls." I must say I did not expect to win the JJ Fox competition. It really was quite a shock for me; I'm not really a competition type, and this was the first serious thing I had ever applied for.

Initially I wasn't going to enter - this was just a piece for my art A Level, but I decided that I had spent so long on it, that I might as well enter and see what happens.

The painting consumed my whole summer; for hours I was hidden away in my neighbours shed, or as I like to say, my 'studio'. The setup I had was quite problematic; a plastic sun-bleached garden chair to sit on, my turpentine was stored in yellowed Tupperware and my oil paints and brushes were stuffed into this heaving cardboard box. Because it was summer I was able to stay painting way out into the cool, protracted evenings. Music was the catalyst to help me finish the piece, as it helped me focus. Marcos Valle's 'Previsão do Tempo' really got me through.

Though it's not the environment that matters, it's the work - which was a large tableau of me and my friends

playing Monopoly. I called the piece 'Second Prize in a beauty contest' (a reference to a community chest card), and it was art coursework, for a project based around the 'everyday'. At that time, I had grown obsessed with board games, especially Monopoly. My friend Issy and I would continually play it, so I thought of doing a painting of it. It would highlight this every day, somewhat mundane occurrence and blow it up to a bigger scale, with dramatic mastermind lighting and lots of props

I compartmentalised the piece when I painted, working my way in a circular direction, from Mara (on the left) round to my face and hands, then to Issy and then to the table, and all its fiddly details. To achieve the contrasting dark background, the photo was taken in the shed with the lights off, and I had set up one warm-toned bedside lamp and another, bluer lightbulb, positioned directly on the startling white tablecloth. You can see these two light sources as some objects have two shadows going in opposite directions. The objects themselves are inspired partly by the excessive symbolism seen in Pre-Raphaelite paintings, (most notably in 'The Awakening Conscience' by William Holman Hunt), though they do not in fact represent anything. The apple is not meant to be a mangled symbol for innocence - I was simply eating an apple. Same with

the garish green clock; it seems to be a modern take on 'Memento Mori'- but in fact I just put it there as I thought it would be an interesting object to paint. I enjoy these meaningless and facile things- there is no reason behind them at all.

The prize giving night was completely fantastic. For quite a compact little gallery there was a great assemblage of artwork. There were prints and photorealistic pencil drawings and all sorts of paintings. Fern and Sophie had the most amazing work exhibited - it's special to see the very genesis of the painting or drawing in class then to see it displayed in a pristine frame.

I should get to work on next year's entry.



# Design & Technology

### **Mr Coxshall**

**Change of Leadership** 



We know that Mr Dave Jones is very much enjoying his retirement and I have been delighted to take the reins of the department since September 2024. Design & Technology is my passion and I am honoured to lead the team and the department onwards in this ever changing world of creativity. Our students' achievements make me proud to be part of a such a vibrant faculty, where facilitating student projects using a range of equipment and machinery is continually rewarding.



This year the students have been extremely lucky to be taught by Mrs Karanjit Sandhu, who has brought a wealth of expertise to the department. Karanjit is also a passionate architect, and students have benefited from related enrichment, assemblies, weekly design news, clubs, careers advice and a caring and nurturing practitioner. We will be sad to see her go as Karanjit will be leaving the College at the end of the year, as she has taken a design teaching post in Abu-Dabhi.



Following two years in post as the Design & Technology technician, Mr Jacques Mare has decided to train to be a teacher of Design & Technology, with his main placement at the College over the coming year. Jacques is an incredibly talented individual and I know that the students will not only be delighted, but also benefit hugely from his teaching, his experience of space science, and his mechanical engineering degree. The fan for open day and the key box are just some of the many items Jacques has created, alongside maintaining the vast amount of equipment, preparing materials and supporting in lessons.





### **Upgrades**



As the department has progressed throughout the year, we have upgraded both our graphics room and our hardware. We have purchased computer desks that enable the same room to be used with flat desks or, at the push of a panel, transform into a modern ICT suite for computer-aided design. The result is now a modern state-of-the-art teaching facility that serves its purpose extremely well. The students really enjoy raising and lowering the PCs to adapt the workspace to suit their needs.



This equipment has allowed us to make advances in the CAD work students can produce. Students can work independently progressing their skills, and, whatever is drawn on the computer, can either be cut out on the laser cutter or printed to create a three-dimensional component. The first KS5 item is designed to be placed on the fuselage of an aeroplane with sensors that beep if a wingtip or other extremity becomes too close to a hangar wall. Next will be the interactive child's entertainment centre, and finally a KS4 product called Vanityfur, a self-feeding device for cats.

### New equipment

One of our main processes for both GCSE and A level continues to be 3D printing and the 4 new Prusa printers



Kaia and Ketaki enjoy the ability to set the machine to print and, on their return the following morning, their CAD constructed part is ready for prototype installation. These machines have an excellent success rate and have allowed us to cope with a big printing demand from our large cohort in Year 11.



We have also added another milling machine to our range to expand machine capabilities, so that several student machining operations can be conducted at once.

Other upgrades to the department include new projects shown below, resin printing facilities, project upgrades making use of the laser printer, for example, we have the ability to laser cut plywood, acrylic and a range of other materials.

One of our enrichment classes was entitled 'doll house design'. Teams were allocated a room and then took charge of decorating it. They had to manufacture all elements including flooring, walls, furniture and lighting with associated links to interior design.

### Traditional processes updated



Wood turning is a wonderful process enjoyed by many students at KS4 and 5. It is creative, relatively fast, it isn't noisy or hot and it is therapeutic. Annabelle (left) is using a new set of turning chisels alongside a new chuck to hold her work in place. This particular component was the base for her coursework element.

### Collaboration



Teams of students work alongside each other at the design phase to extract and evaluate possible design solutions. This is common practice and enables further ideas to be realised. Whilst each student has an independent project, they also benefit from this collaborative approach.

### **Arkwright Scholarship**



This year, Libby Hart, (above with her sponsor from JTGlobal), was awarded the Arkwright scholarship. This extensive process involved an online application, followed by an exam for successful applicants and finally an online interview. This rigorous process enables scholars opportunities throughout their studies and we are very proud of our historic links with our alumni and the Arkwright scheme.

## "What would you do if you were an engineer?" competition



Our Year 8 students opted into a range of lunchtime lectures on a vast range of topics from a Ford car engineer, a games developer who worked with Minecraft, the Young Women Engineer of the Year, Titi Oliyide, a talk of space engineering and tooth engineering, as part of this year's 'What would you do if you were an engineer?' competition.

Our students used these talks to gain inspiration for their design solutions. Each member of Year 8 presented their design work on A3 with annotations surrounding their design. They also had to write a letter to the judging panel explaining why their idea should be made into a real life item, with the ultimate prize of their idea being manufactured by Kingston University.

We had 3 prizes awarded this year and the following students were invited to a prize giving at Highlands

College where highly commended pupils were presented with a framed certificate and a badge by VIP guests and the winner was presented with a trophy, certificate, and badge.

#### **Anti-Shake Mug**



Cara in Year 9 had the honour of seeing the item she designed for last year's competition chosen by Kingston University to be manufactured into a working prototype. Her idea was a cup that would not spill should a person not be able to hold it steady. A representative from the university attended the awards ceremony at Highlands and explained how they tackled the problem using elements of degree level engineering. Students were fascinated to hear about 6 degrees of freedom of movement! Cara was able to keep a 3D printed early model of her design and the final prototype.



#### Jewellery design and manufacture



Our Year 12 students created a range of different jewellery items focusing on the copper ring. They performed 2 stage silver soldering to create a range of different designs. Students extended upon their lower school skills to work, shape and craft a fitted copper ring with further designs on the ring band. They used a propane blowtorch with flux, appropriate PPE and many hours of precision work to achieve their finished items.



#### **Pallot Steam Museum**



As part of Design & Technology GCSE, our Y10 students attended the Pallot Steam Museum. Students gained an insight into historical product design and saw how this relates to modern day life. They especially enjoyed the carriages of the steam train. This experience could feed into their GCSE coursework and be a source of inspiration.





This desire comes with a sense of longing and regret most of the characters are unhappy with their situation, regretting previous choices.


Towards the end there is a sort of realisation that although the past is a foreign country, a new future can be created.



First stop, not long after they touched down, was a visit to The Guardian Newsroom for a 'Future of New's workshop and tour. Students learnt about the history of the newspaper and publishing process, then enhanced their understanding of the changing industry by designing news apps.

Then the day wasn't quite over, as students spent the afternoon at Warner Bros Studios for the Making of Harry Potter. Visiting where all movies in the franchise were filmed, they got to see the behind-the-scenes filmmaking process: costumes, props, and sets, as well as learning about production roles and marketing.

On the itinerary for day two, was a visit to Sky HQ. The Sky shuttle bus took them to the campus and television studios, to arrive at a modern, impressive site, where Sky News and Sky Sports are filmed and employees of the huge media company work. Students enjoyed a behind-the-scenes tour but weren't allowed to take any photos. They took part in a workshop with professionals, taking on roles, to script, present, film and edit TV news reports with industry cameras and software, on the topic of 'Influencer Culture'.

After a busy morning, the afternoon was spent at Leicester

Square and Covent Garden, ahead of an evening at the Lyceum Theatre on the West End watching The Lion King.

A highlight for many, was Madame Tussauds on day three, where students were excited to 'meet' stars such as Beyonce, Leonardo DiCaprio, and the Marvel superheroes: a 4D film experience completed the visit.

After lunch at the market, the afternoon was spent at The Museum of Brands, learning about gender in advertising throughout the last century, revamping older adverts, and seeing the impressive collection of products and decades of evolving consumer culture through the Time Tunnel. The day concluded in front of the UK's biggest cinema screen at the BFI IMAX, watching Blade Runner 2049.

Students were incredibly lucky that the Disney 100 exhibition was in London when they were: a fantastic showcase of artifacts, artwork, costumes and props from the achieves.

Studied as a core part of media industries in lessons, visiting this on their last day was a valuable experience, exploring the history of Disney's products and production processes, over the last 100 years. Then there was just enough time for a stop at Oxford Street for some souvenirs (Primark), before heading to the airport for the flight home.

### Q-MUN-3 Conference

Talia YEAR 12 National Model United Nations, originally invented as a simulation of the League of Nations, traces its origins to 1927.

It has since transitioned to what we now know it as Model UN in 1943. This event is held across the globe, from small one-day conferences like QMUN, which the students of JCG attended, to worldwide conferences uniting over 5,000 young minds in places such as New York. This November, 18 bright Year 12's travelled to Chester to be a part of their first ever MUN, writing fruitful resolutions and opening speeches to present to their committees. Roughly 230 students from 15 schools across the Northwest (plus Jersey) descended on the Queen's School to debate geopolitics and international diplomacy.

Intimidated at first, all the students eventually adjusted to

the profound terminology and intense debates, growing in confidence to express their opinions to their committees. These committees varied from Security Council to Human Rights and tackled topics such as cultural repatriation of cultural properties, restoration of coral reefs and progression into gangs. The conferences are entirely led by students, which really emphasises the extent of youth involvement that the conferences target. Walking away with new friends and experiencing thorough discussions, every student was enlightened to an opportunity that will provide them great advantages in life, improving confidence, communication, and teamwork skills. We are delighted to have MUN at JCG.

### **Brain Day**

At the end of January, A Level Psychology students at JCG and VCJ were given the opportunity to attend Brain Day with Neuroscientist, Dr Guy Sutton.

Dr Sutton's interactive tutorial covered a broad a range of topics based around the very latest in neuroscientific research. This included a sheep brain dissection where students had the opportunity to discover the basics of brain anatomy. The neuroscience behind criminality and mental health was also investigated. He then moved on to discuss more complex subjects such as the effects of drug use on the brain, as well as modern methods used to study the brain through brain imaging and internal deep brain stimulation.

Dr Sutton finished his session by showing students some new developments in neuroscience and psychology including advancements in areas such as neural decoding.

which is being used to create prosthetics for paralysed individuals, as well as some early research being made into decoding our thoughts into sound waves.





### Field work

In preparation for writing their A Level coursework (NEAs), Year 12 Geographers completed two days being exposed to a range of potential primary data collection techniques including beach profiling, conducting questionnaires, identifying vegetation types and environmental quality surveys.

In addition, they were extremely fortunate to receive presentations and conduct interviews with an array of experts and stakeholders. We are so grateful to the following people for offering their time and expertise for our students: Tahnee Blackmore at Jersey Heritage, Simon


The questions varied in difficulty as we were able to complete some of them in under 10 minutes whereas

There was great collaboration in the running of the events, with help from Sixth formers and House Captains aiding with the marking and timing.



### European Day of Languages



In 2022, **Libby** was the first girl to be selected for the Ashburton Team. In 2023, she won the Channel Islands Championships in Guernsey against very strong opposition, including several Commonwealth Games shooters.



**Louisa** was top scorer in the Ashburton Team in July 2023. She was second highest scorer in the competition, a boy from Epsom scored 1 V bull more. She was also one of two plotters for the coaches in the Ashburton.

Having the top score in our Ashburton Team, she shot in the Spencer Mellish, an individual competition at 500 yards fired directly after the Ashburton. (Each school's best shot).

She was selected for the Athelings, the British Cadet Rifle Team (BCRT) which shot in the Canadian Cadet Championships and the Dominion of Canada Rifle Championships in August. She is the first girl from the Channel Islands to be selected for this prestigious team.

**Louise** also shot and plotted in the Ashburton Team. I was delighted with her selection.

In 2021, she contracted Covid on the second day at Bisley and had to leave, thus she wasn't able to have scores to put forward for Athelings, which I believe she was capable of.

Both girls did this extremely quickly, which was undoubtedly a major factor in the team's polished performance.


Louisa I shoot both smallbore and fullbore rifles, one is indoor the other outdoor, and I travel each year to the Bisley Imperial meeting, the biggest

Additionally, I've gained valuable skills in leadership, teamwork, and discipline through the various training exercises and activities we've participated in together.

Since leading the section, I have strived to create a positive and inclusive environment where every cadet feels valued and motivated to excel. Through effective communication and mentorship, I have worked to foster a sense of unity and purpose within the team, enabling us to accomplish our goals more effectively.

#### **RAF Camp**

Each summer, the RAF section has the opportunity to visit an active RAF camp or base, where they can build and develop new skills. This summer, the RAF section combined with the Royal Navy section and visited RAF Benson. Throughout the week, the cadets experienced life on the camp while participating in various activities. They had the chance to visit the camp's air traffic control and fire station. Additionally, they were fortunate to tour 28 and 33 squadrons, where they were able to explore a Puma and Chinook.

#### **Air Squadron Trophy Competition**

Each year, the RAF section chooses a team of the best 13 cadets to attend the Royal Air Squadron Trophy Competition. The cadets travelled to Blandford, where they were tested on various disciplines, including air-rifle shooting, first aid, command tasks, and drill. The Victoria College CCF is included in the southwest region, which means that the RAF section competes against the other CCF RAF sections in the southwest region of the UK. To qualify for the National competition, one must place in the

top 3 positions.

The National Royal Air Squadron Competition is for the top 15 RAF Sections in the UK. Last year's team worked incredibly hard to qualify and had the privilege to compete in the National competition. The team that was sent was competing against the best RAF sections in the UK. It is one of the many opportunities that the RAF section offers to its cadets.

#### **Flying**

Perhaps the best opportunities available to RAF cadets are the flying experiences. The RAF section operates multiple air experience flights each year in partnership with the Jersey Aero Club. Cadets have the chance to fly an aeroplane on a circumnavigation of the island one-on-one with an instructor, gaining real-world aviation experience and enjoying excellent views. Priority is given to those who haven't flown before, ensuring that all cadets can experience this amazing opportunity.

For the most capable aviators and most dedicated cadets, there is an even greater opportunity available. Recently, three of our senior cadets participated in the Air Cadet Pilot scheme. The Air Cadets Pilot Scheme (ACPS) is a two-week, all-inclusive flight training course in the UK designed to train cadets with minimal flying experience to fly solo.

Cadets receive 12 hours of flying lessons with an instructor, alongside several hours of theory classroom-based lessons. At the end of the course, cadets have the chance to complete a solo circuit – taxiing, taking off, flying, and landing – all without anyone else onboard the plane. It truly is a once in a lifetime experience.

It has been a busy year in the RAF Section, and it is soon to grow with the induction of new recruits in Year 9. We look forward to introducing the new recruits to our section so we can get more people involved in all the exciting activities we take part in. With the joint Royal Navy and RAF exercise ahead, this will be a fantastic opportunity for

the recruits to experience. The arrival of new recruits will also help some of the more senior members as it will give them the opportunity to promote leadership skills. We look forward to seeing what the new recruits and cadets get up to this year.

#### **Festival of Cultures**

The Festival of Cultures is a day which celebrates cultures from around the world, as well as our very own unique cultural heritage in Jersey. During the Jèrriais workshop, we learned about two traditional local products - les mervèlles dé Jèrri et lé nièr beurre - Jersey wonders and black butter. We found out how they are made and tasted them, and learned how to say whether we liked or disliked them in Jèrriais. At lunchtime, the Jèrriais stall at the International Food Fayre was a great success, with over 100 Jersey wonders enjoyed by students and staff.

Please consider getting involved with some of the Jèrriais opportunities available at JCG to help to revitalise Jersey's native language!



## Guernsey trip

The Archive Team haven't only been transforming JCG's surroundings through the Curated School projects but have taken our archive outside of JCG and Jersey!

When completing our initial investigation into our archive, the discovery of some beautiful, marbled books belonging to Constance Le Marinel were found in their original condition by Mrs Peters, our Librarian and Archivist. Incredibly, the bookplates gave us an indication of where they came from - they are signed by the Principal of Guernsey Ladies College and the founders of Guernsey's Guille-Allès Library, Thomas Guille and Frederick Allès.



Constance's books were awarded for all kinds of subjects, from wood carving to arithmetic and physics, dating back to 1899. At the time, they would have been used for teaching resources and reading. We questioned how they had ended up at our archive and after some digging, discovered that the books had been inherited by Constance's brother, Reverend Matthew Le Marinel, after his sister's death in 1939. He visited Jersey Ladies' College to offer religious instruction and donated the books in the

Mrs Peters knew the books needed a permanent home. After consulting Jersey Archive and Jersey Library, she contacted Guernsey Library, who were delighted to be reunited with them. One of our key Archive team members, Ella, corresponded with the Guille-Allès Library to organise their return, and we also spread the news of the discovery on both radio and television! After a small setback due to

Storm Ciaran, we set off on our day trip to Guernsey on the 14th of December 2023.



With the books in our backpacks, our team braved the slightly damp Jersey to Guernsey boat crossing and made our way through the town of St Peter Port up to the Guille-Allès Library. The library was so beautiful, with the original tiles and decorations. We were lucky enough to be able to have a tour of all the floors of the library, from the amazing children's library space, the quiet areas, and the attic areas housing the story tower, science rooms and even relics from the old museum! It was so interesting to learn about the founders, Frederick and Thomas, their travels in New York and dreams of starting a library in Guernsey, and the social history of the library including lectures that had taken place in the start of the 20th century.

After our galettes for lunch and an interview with the Guernsey Post, we made our way to The Ladies' College, Guernsey to take Constance's books home. It was great to hand them over and see them returned to their new archive - we've started a trend!

After a walk through town and a hot chocolate, we made our way back to the ferry terminal. It's brilliant to be part of such an amazing team and doing work that means we can reunite the past with the present.

## JCG Memories

Our Archivist, Mrs Peters, has uncovered funny facts and memories among the many documents in the College Archive. Here is a selection.

#### Past exams subjects

According to a newspaper advertisement dating from 1881, when the school was in its infancy, these were the subjects being offered: Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, English Grammar, Composition and Literature, History, Geography, Mathematics, Natural Science, Religious instruction, French, German languages and literatures, Latin, Greek, Drawing, Class singing and harmony, Domestic and political economy, Calisthenics and Needlework.

How did they find time for all of them you ask? Well, they weren't all examined subjects, but when it was felt appropriate students were put forward to sit exams for the following (despite being young women):

- Cambridge Local Exams
- Science and Art Exams of South Kensington
- Cambridge Exam for women (ironically Cambridge University did not grant actual degree qualifications to women until the 1940s)
- Matriculation at London University (for those looking to undertake a degree course.) The University of London was the only University in England to award degrees to women at that time. Despite passing university examinations, women were not allowed to be awarded degrees until 1878 at University of London, 1895 at Durham, 1920 at Oxford, and 1948 at Cambridge.)
- The Brevet de Capacité in Paris (believed to be an exam for those wishing to be primary school teachers)



# Adelaide Casely Hayford

Adelaide, one of JCG's founding students, was the subject of an article by Matthew Parker in 'History Today' in November 2023. Here are some extracts from it.



"She was born Adelaide Smith in Freetown in 1868. Wealthy Krios - the heavily Westernised coastal elite - were used to sending their children to school in England, but her father, on his retirement in 1872, moved his whole family there. Her earliest memory, she later wrote, was not of Africa but of the sea voyage and arriving in England. They ended up in St. Helier in Jersey,

where her childhood was 'glorious... characterized by a spontaneous happiness and joy'.

Aged 12, she and her younger sister started at Jersey Ladies' College, where they were the only black pupils. 'School life still remains a gorgeous memory', she later wrote: 'How happy we were in spite of our colour, or perhaps because of it, since we were singled out for extra titbits of love, kindliness, and good will. What did we know of racial prejudice, and an inferiority complex? Nothing! But we knew a lot about the milk of human kindness.'

Her father's dying wish in the late 1890s was that she and her unmarried sister return to Africa. It was a 'terrible wrench' leaving Jersey, but arriving in Sierra Leone was worse. The 'educated Africans' of Freetown 'shunned us, snubbed us, ostracised us'.

Furthermore, little of the family money was left by the time of their father's death and, after the ending of her shortlived marriage to distinguished Gold Coast nationalist Joseph Casely Hayford, the sisters needed to be self-supporting. Adelaide took on pupils for tuition and taught music, which soon led to a 'Great Scheme': a Technical School for Girls, inspired in part by her own difficulties in supporting herself and by what she had seen of local girls' schools. Women's education in West Africa, she said, was 'a hundred years behind men's, with 'nothing to fit them for the battles of life'. Her precept was that women had to be economically independent to retain their self-respect; her school would produce girls able to earn their own living.


Perhaps most striking was her ambition to 'hear the young mothers teaching their sons the glory of black citizenship, rather than encouraging them to bewail the fact that they were not white' Meetings were held to raise funds, but the public was unenthusiastic. But she raised money in the United States and in late 1923 the school opened with 14 pupils. Casely Hayford would have preferred the pupils 'instead of blindly copying European fashions' to be 'dressed in attractive native garments', but this idea was firmly rejected by the Krio community.

Adelaide Casely Hayford was one of the first African women to gain prominence in public life and paved the way for others to follow. Although not all her ambitions for the school were realised, nonetheless in 1924 she became the sole black female member of the colony's Education Board. In this role she continued to campaign for female education to be given equal status with male, for schools to instil 'some pride of race, love of country, and pride in their own colour', and for the employment of properly trained and paid African teachers, using African- produced textbooks.


#### **Mr Palfreyman**

# LEAP Jersey 2024 breaks records



With 88 students taking part, including 49 international students coming from 20 different destinations, LEAP Jersey 2024 saw one of the most globally diverse group of students ever gathered in Jersey.

We were incredibly honoured to share this success with His Excellency Vice Admiral Jeremy Kyd, who officially opened LEAP on Wednesday 10th July.

This year, students from local secondary schools (Les Quennevais, Grainville, Le Rocquier, Hautlieu, Beaulieu and JCG) joined the female leadership programme along with delegates from the USA, Canada, Antigua,

Bermuda, Cayman Islands, Columbia, France, India, Thailand, Nepal, Afghanistan, Taiwan, China, Korea, Japan, Australia, England, Scotland, and Guernsey.

Thanks to the support of local companies, the vast majority (over 80%) of local students were able to attend for free, whilst 17 international students had all their costs (including flights) covered.

# In grateful appreciation: a personal reflection of Philip Taylor

I first met Philip in early 2008 in the Board room at the Education Department. He was Chair of Governors at the time and on the panel for the next Principal of JCG. After a duly rigorous interview, panel members were asked if they had any further questions. As panel members each gave their answer, it was to my relief that there didn't seem to be any and the interview was drawing to a close. That is until we got to Philip. 'Yes', he said, 'Are you as good as you think you are?' After an interminable pause (how do you answer such a question?) I think my response was 'Well that is for you decide.' Perhaps it was the naive energy and passion of a would-be rookie Principal that elicited such a question. Anyway, sometime later that day I got the call to invite me to be Principal.

Philip was my first Chair of Governors and his killer question morphed into one that referred to the College as a whole - 'are we as good as we can be?' Well of course the answer was always no but we were getting there. It was this ambition and aspiration that I admired, found rightly challenging and perhaps, in turn, transferred onto the College - how can we be better?

Eighteen months after starting as Principal, I found myself with Philip, visiting his old school Malvern College. We were there to inquire about their foundation, founded hundreds of years ago and was now the bedrock of the College's success, financial and otherwise. We had an inkling that JCG would benefit from something similar - a charity in its own right separate from but wholly focused on the College and wider educational benefit to the island. We returned from Malvern and began setting out our own ambition and

sometime later in 2011, Philip, Sally le Brocq, our Foundation Patron, and I stood on the steps of the Royal Court holding our newly passed constitution. It was an exciting day. The JCG Foundation had been born and Philip was its first Chair.

In July of this year, Philip stood down as Chair after thirteen years of dedicated leadership. This also marked the conclusion of a connection with the College, from Governor to Foundation, of over a quarter of a century. Philip's commitment extended beyond the formal role of Chair. With his wife, Odette, they generously supported students through their education, from Year 7 to completion of A levels. Providing assistance for those that might otherwise not be able to afford to attend JCG was and remains a major driver for Philip in the creation of the Foundation.

I was always rather nervous of my annual meetings with them, especially Odette, to update them on the student's progress and how their gift was making an impact. Odette possessed a laser-like focus and a clarity of expression that made 'straight to the point' seem like a rather obtuse way of talking. I had to be on my toes. As proud Principal, I would tell them of the trips the student had attended and extol the benefits of visiting far flung places around the world, to be told in very clear terms by Odette that the students could have benefitted just as well by visiting Devon. She did have a point.

It is no underestimation to say that the Foundation has grown immeasurably under Philip's tutelage and care. From humble begins, it is now a major force for educational good for the College, for the island and beyond and set to have an impact for year's to come. Indeed, the same applies to me; for the last sixteen years I have grown to see him as a father figure and from someone I have learnt so much.

On behalf of the College, thank you Philip. It is impossible to quantify the time you have dedicated to our College in thought and action and unrelenting kindness. Your impact has transformed the College, its reach and its aspiration for today and for generations to come.
