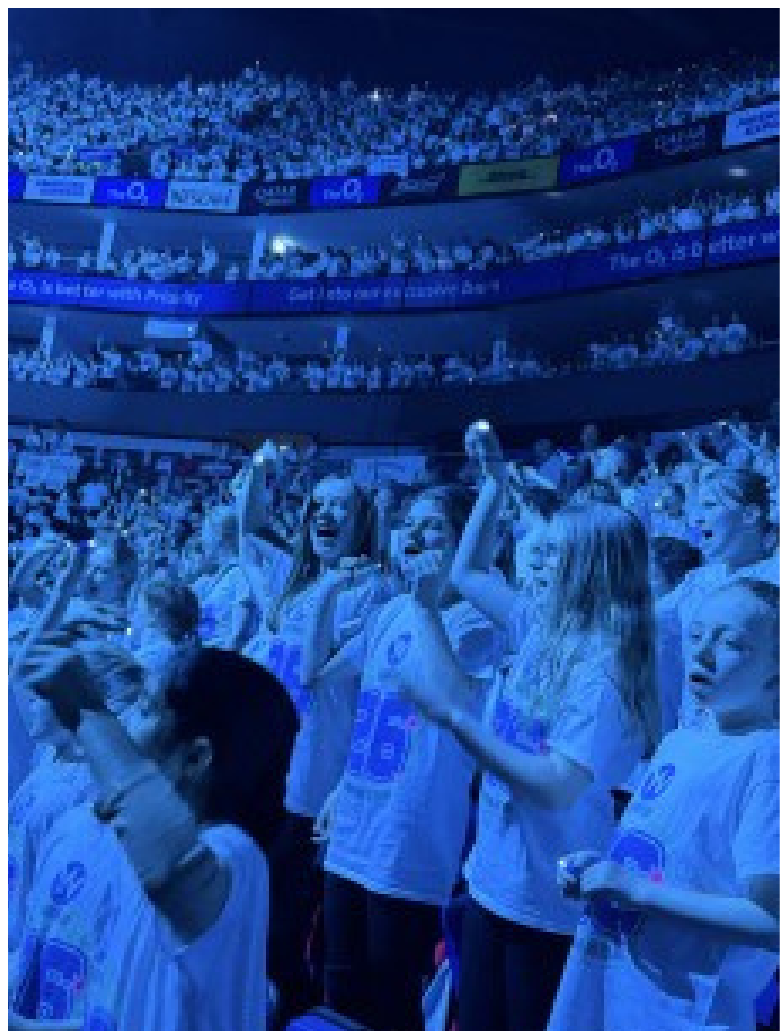
Mrs Killick and our fabulous Music Leaders, Izzy, Maddie and Charlotte were also interviewed about the day for BBC Radio Jersey.

HEALTH & HYGIENE REMINDER

We would like to take this opportunity to remind families about threadworm, which is a very common childhood condition, particularly among primary-aged children. While it can sound worrying, it is not serious and is easily treated. Most families will encounter it at some point, and it does not reflect on home or school hygiene.

Threadworms are tiny white worms that live in the bowel and are spread through everyday contact, such as touching shared surfaces, toys, or through hand-to-mouth contact. This is why they are common in school and nursery environments.

Symptoms can include:

- Itching around the bottom, especially at night
- Disturbed sleep
- Occasionally seeing small white threads in the stool or around the bottom

Many children show no symptoms at all.

HEALTH & HYGIENE REMINDER

At school, we have strong hygiene routines in place. All classrooms and shared areas are cleaned daily, and our bathrooms are cleaned more than once each day by our onsite Housekeeping team. In addition, children are encouraged and closely supported to wash their hands regularly throughout the school day.

If families ever suspect threadworm, treatment is simple and medication is available from pharmacies. Treating promptly, alongside good handwashing and basic hygiene at home, is very effective in breaking the cycle of infection.

This is a normal part of childhood and something schools and families manage regularly and successfully.

PUPIL SAFETY MESSAGE



We kindly remind all parents that **children should not be let out of vehicles in the middle of the road** when dropping them off at school. This creates a **significant safety risk** for your child, other students, and drivers.

To ensure everyone's safety:

- Children must **exit the vehicles only when safely parked** and in the appropriate drop off area.
- **Do not stop in the middle of the road** to let your child out, as this endangers both them, pedestrians and other road users.

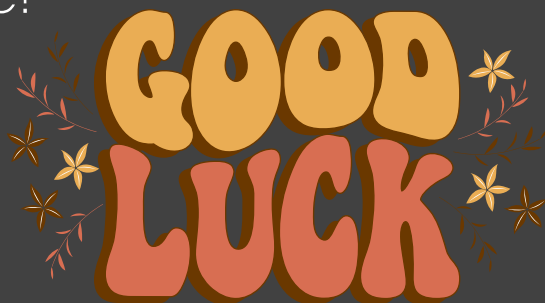

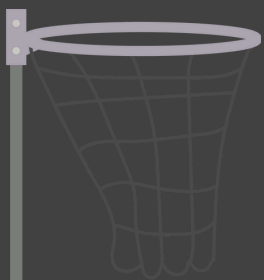

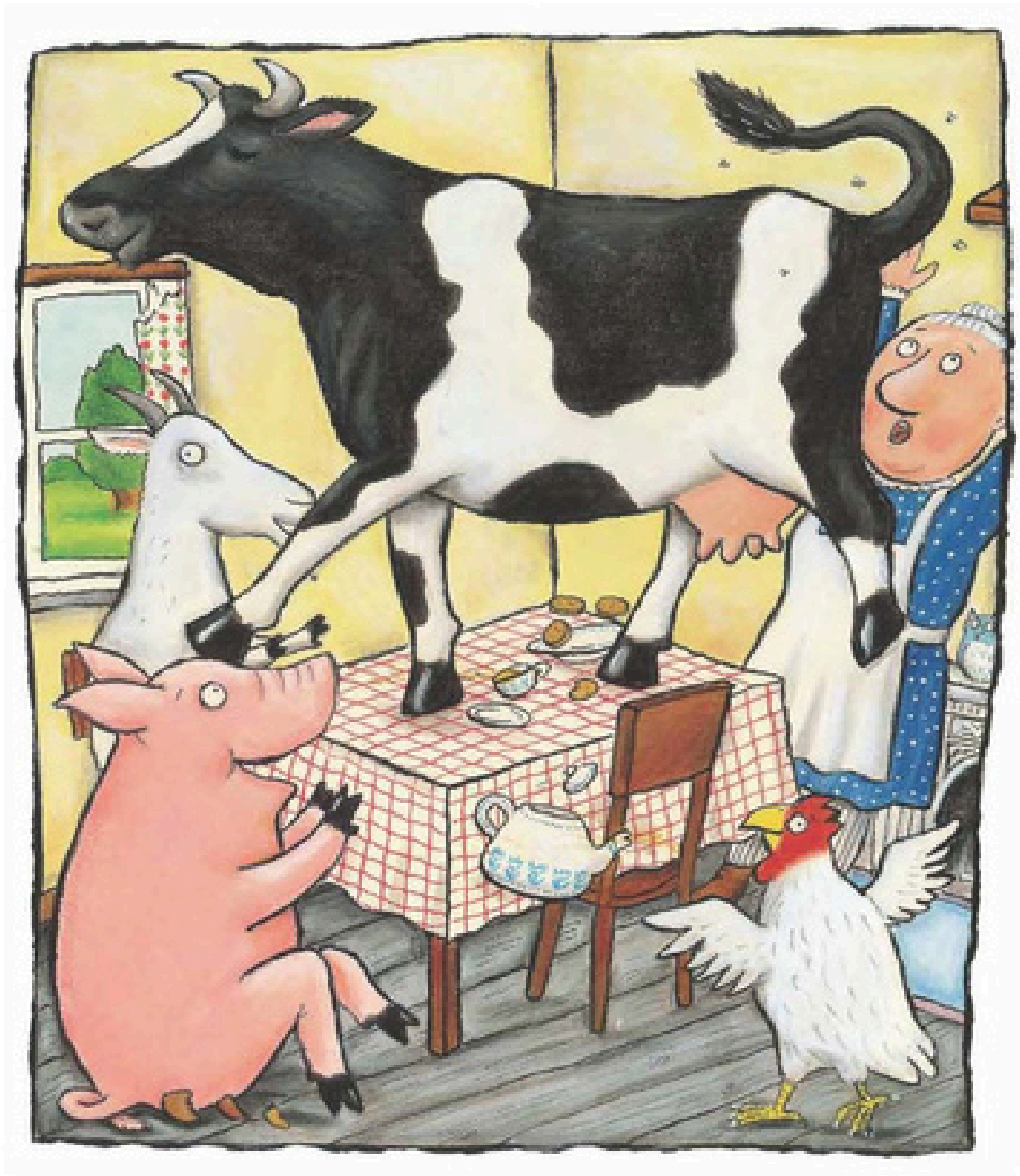
